The latest addition to camp features 4 brand new, state of the art, platform tennis courts equipped with lights and heaters. The courts are connected to a clubhouse that will also hold and store the paddle ball gear. Camp has brought in 2 former professional platform tennis players, Laura Berendt and Denise Murphy, to help the campers and staff learn the new and exciting sport. Camp is even offering a new Paddle Club to teach campers how to play the game correctly and safely.







THIS WEEK IN KAWAGA HISTORY

Have you ever wondered where the Kawaga Ideal actually came from? Kawaga historian and alum, Bob Sideman (CK 1955-1964 & '69), came up with the answer in a letter written by Lou Ehrenreich, Kawaga's Director and son of Doc E. It seems that somebody had attributed the Ideal to General Douglas Macarthur in the days following his death. Lou disputed this claim in a letter written to the *Chicago Tribune* in April, 1964, as follows:



"There is no doubt that General Douglas Macarthur made a fine contribution in preserving our American way of life, but at times much is attributed to the Great for which they actually have no responsibility. I refer specifically to the publicity given General Macarthur for being the author of 'A Father's Prayer.'

This father's prayer has been one of the guiding principles of our camp for many a year. It was not written by General Macarthur. We first ran across it in Tony's Scrapbook, edited by Anthony Wons and published in 1932-33 by Reilly & Lee Company, Chicago... and published under the title, 'When A Father Prays.' The author is anonymous.

I am sure that General Macarthur would not want credit for something he had no part in composing."
